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# Manager's Update

Trees, trees, beautiful trees! The refuge planted 3,000 trees along the Rio Grande in February with the help of many volunteers. This included members of the Amigos, refuge volunteers and staff from Bosque del Apache, New Mexico Volunteers for the Outdoors, New Mexico Audubon Society, staff from the Interstate Stream Commission and Fish and Wildlife Staff from the Regional Office and from the Mexican Gray Wolf Recovery Program. Many thanks to everyone!

This project is to restore habitat for Rio Grande Silvery Minnow, Southwestern Willow Flycatcher, and Yellow-billed Cuckoo. In this same general area, the refuge has planted over 10,000 native trees to date, and plans to plant an additional 5000 trees over the next 2-3 years (primarily Gooding's and coyote willow, and cottonwood). Over time (predicted 4-5 years), as vegetation matures, habitat will become suitable for the Southwestern Willow Flycatcher and Yellow-billed Cuckoo.

We had a successful annual meeting on January 18, with about 110 people attending and a wonderful talk about the mountain lions of the Middle Rio Grande area. Thanks to the Amigos Board for a job well done and thanks to all of you who attended.

Greeting friends and visitors at Sevilleta's Visitors Center are two new faces: Tish and Bill. They are new to Sevilleta but seasoned RV volunteers with over 15 years of service and work at more than a half dozen other wildlife refuges. They call South Dakota home, but jumped quickly into life in New Mexico, spending their free days helping with tree planting, wolf captures, and other activities. Welcome aboard.

Another friendly volunteer face is more appreciated by animals on the refuge than visitors at the front desk. Kim helps maintain more than a dozen "drinkers" scattered across the arid landscape. Pumps need to be fixed, solar panels cleaned, debris removed, and trail cameras maintained. If you see animal pictures on the Amigos Facebook page, or in some other format, Kim has probably had a hand in making that possible. She puts in long hours and drives many miles.

A final "hats off" to volunteers who have helped plant more than 3,000 Goodling's willows and cottonwood trees in Sevilleta's Wetlands over several days in mid-February. Several Amigos members assisted staff members in the process, but many more volunteers came from Bosque del Apache, Audubon, the Wolf Recovery Program, and elsewhere to help re-establish vegetation along new levees and river banks.

# **Visitor Center Happenings**


Have you been to the Visitor Center lately? If not, we have some exciting new things to tell you about.

First of all we have a new fish tank around the corner in the exhibits room. This 60 gallon tank is now home to 6 species of fish that are native to New Mexico. They are the Flathead Chub, Mosquito Fish, Red Shiner, Longnose Dace, Fathead Minnow and the Rio Grande Silvery Minnow. These are the same species that we use in our 'Fish in the Classroom' program. The backdrop for our aquarium was drawn by last summer's interns Carol and Madison.

In case you're not aware, our sources of income are memberships, revenue from the Nature Store and donations. Our donation box has been a part of the center for many years but it has had a recent addition. The box was originally crafted in 2014 by Dennis Prichard, a former Sevilleta employee. It wasn't very visible in its previous location so Nancy Barnes, one of our RV Volunteers, contacted Dennis to see what he could do to remedy this. He created a magnificent stand for the box to perch on. Dennis also crafted the overhead sign for our Nature Store.

Dennis worked at Sevilleta from 2002 to 2011 serving as Deputy Refuge Manager and occasionally as Acting Refuge Manager. He is a gifted artist who creates wooden objects in a style called Intarsia. Basically it is cutting different wood species into pieces that are shaped and then fitted together to make a scene or object. Check out his website at dennisprichardworksinwood.com.

Our newest addition is the mounted elk head in the front room. Our Refuge Manager, Kathy Granillo, received a call from Fish & Wildlife Law Enforcement asking if Sevilleta would like to exhibit an elk head that had recently come into their possession. An outfitter from New Mexico had taken a client on a hunt for a Pronghorn Antelope. While on the hunt the client saw an elk and decided to shoot that as well. The only problem was that he did not have a valid permit for the elk. The outfitter (who was already being watched for other violations) made the mistake of posting pictures on social media which of course were seen by Fish & Wildlife investigators. The hunter and outfitter were both fined. The elk had already been taken to the taxidermist and was then confiscated for use in the investigation. He now watches over the Visitor Center in all his magnificent glory from the west wall. Make plans to stop in and see all of these new things that represent our refuge.
