Manager's Update

I begin these notes with the bad news that the Visitor Center was once again broken in to in the wee hours. Two young men stole various optic and GPS equipment. Not really much stuff compared to the effort they put into it. We did get some brief camera footage of them both, but not enough to see faces very well. Our law enforcement folks are investigating. Meanwhile we are beefing up our security measures.

Much better news - the new intern, Jena, started August 19. She is working with Jeannine to develop Drawn to Sevilleta poster contest virtually and other environmental education projects.

I have selected the refuge Heavy Equipment Operator and we are now waiting for all of the approval process to happen. He will start October 13. I also got approval to hire another maintenance position and have submitted the paperwork. This will fill a position that we haven't had since 2012.

The Bureau of Reclamation has agreed to help us repair some water control structures in our wetland units and to do some repair work on the two roads that parallel the Unit 7 drain. We hope all will be done prior to waterfowl season (late October). Dove season opened Sept 1 FYI.

Federal Highways (via contractor) finished up the Rio Puerco bridge work - closing off access to the old bridge, and finishing up some fencing. They already added new bat houses to the new bridge that are designed and built by our local bat expert, Justin Stevenson.

We held the annual Sevilleta butterfly count August 22. We had one team of 3 people survey the area around the Visitor Center and the Nature Trail, and one team of 2 cover the wetland areas. Both teams had very few butterflies compared to previous counts, but still managed to find a variety of species including monarchs. There are tons of sunflowers in bloom in the wetlands and all over the HQ area and these are attractive to many butterflies.

Our Directorate Fellows Program person Catherine completed her project - thanks to all of you who took the time to talk with her and to watch her presentation.

The front gate entrance gate is now open again Monday-Friday, 8 am to 4:30 pm and the public is welcome to park in the parking lot at the Visitor Center. Trails are open and there are still lots of wildflowers along the trails and around the Visitor Center.

Visitor Center Happenings

About the only benefit to this virus thing is having LOTS of time to do things around the house. I decided to clean out closets, drawers and cabinets. I'm doing it very slowly though, don't want to wear myself out!

I started with the cabinet in my office/library that held a lot of pictures. For several years I have just tossed things in there meaning to organize things later. Well, later is now. It took twenty minutes to pull everything out but three days to put it all back!

One of the interesting things that I found in that mess was a packet of pictures that had been taken at Sevilleta. Remember cameras that used film, negatives, and envelopes from the processor? There they were.

My husband Jim and I had come to Socorro in late December of 2003. We were thinking about moving here from Denver and wanted to see what the area was like in the winter months. On our way home we decided to stop at Sevilleta and see what this refuge was all about. When we pulled in and parked we were surprised to see a group of Boy Scouts in uniform milling around the front of the Visitor Center. When we asked what was going on we were told that they were getting ready to dedicate the new flag pole in front of the center. Jim had his camera in the car so he took pictures of the event.

The flag pole had been a project for one of the scouts who was in the process of obtaining his Eagle Scout badge. One of the requirements for this badge is to plan, develop and carry out a service project which is useful to your church, school or community. Dennis Pritchard who was the Acting Refuge Manager at that time gave a speech explaining the project and then turned it over to the scouts. The honor guard approached the flagpole and hoisted the flag to the top. I have to tell you that it was very moving to watch these young men.

When I found these pictures I contacted Dennis to see what he remembered about the project. He remembered that the pole had been constructed so it would sway during a hard wind and not snap off. He also contacted the Boy Scout Council in Albuquerque in order to find out more about the troop. Troop 335 was affiliated with the Mormon Church in Los Lunas. I have tried several different phone numbers listed for the church but none are current. The very tall young man on the right in the picture with Dennis is the scout who originated the project. If anyone recognizes these young men or knows any more about the project, please let me know.
