Manager's Update

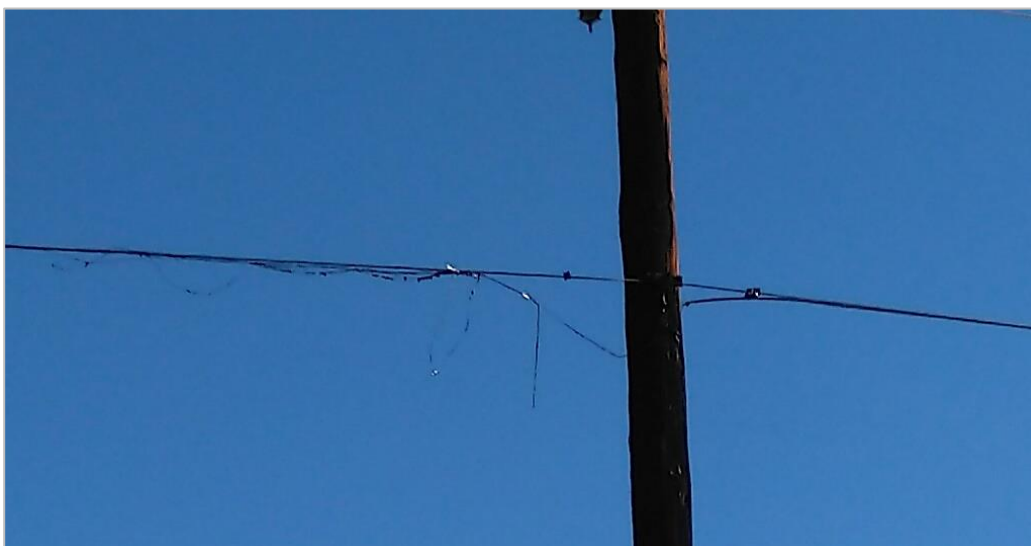
I'm excited to announce our new Heavy Equipment Operator started Tuesday, October 13. His name is Pete Miranda. He will be a good fit with the refuge with his mixture of heavy equipment experience and farming background. He will be out soon grading roads. More exciting news is that the Region added another maintenance position to the refuge! The selection process is underway and hopefully by the next newsletter we will have a person in place. This replaces a position that we lost about 8 years ago when there was a budget crunch.

Waterfowl season opened October 29 on the refuge for hunting in Units A and B. We began putting water in Unit B on October 23, and the ducks were in there the next day. We suspect it will be a popular place to hunt this season.

We released 370 prairie dogs on September 29 in partnership with Prairie Dog Pals. That brings our total for the year to over 700 Gunnison's prairie dogs released.

The Refuge was without internet or phones for about 10 days in October – there was a crash on I-25 and a semi went off the road into one of the power poles just north of San Acacia and burst into flames. The power pole also carries our internet cable, and it got shredded. If you tried to contact the refuge during that time, we apologize for not answering the phones.

Amigos, Hola!

Well, the snow storm this week was a real surprise in Albuquerque... always seems to circle around us and show up elsewhere. It was delightful, beautiful and welcome. Looks like we've had moisture almost everywhere across the state this week. That should improve our fire situation. Drought conditions in NM never seem to be far off and this year's minimal monsoon didn't help much. On the other hand, we could be facing the sort of fires occurring in CA or CO. You wonder where I'm going with this? Well, Sevilleta is my frame of reference when I hear about wildfires. Sevilleta is roughly a quarter million acres. Imagine what we would lose if it all burned. As of October 27, 2020, over 8,836 fires have burned 4,359,517 acres (1,764,234 ha), more than 4% of California's roughly 100 million acres of land. That's almost 20 Sevilletas. The Cal fires have impinged on a minimum of 3 national parks, too. In CO, the East Troublesome fire crossed into Rocky Mountain National Park last week. We hear counts of structures burned, and firefighters coming from far and wide to jump into the smoke. I think about the impact on the birds and animals... we can't count the losses there. But we can, as friends of refuges and parks, keep in mind what we have at Sevilleta. We can treasure the space, the views, the flora and fauna. We can do our best to preserve it by considering our activities while we are on the refuge. We can volunteer to work with refuge staff to maintain the current state of the refuge. We can contribute financially to the projects underway to improve access for visitors. All these things are valuable contributions members like you have been performing for years. Let's keep it up...that's what friends do!!

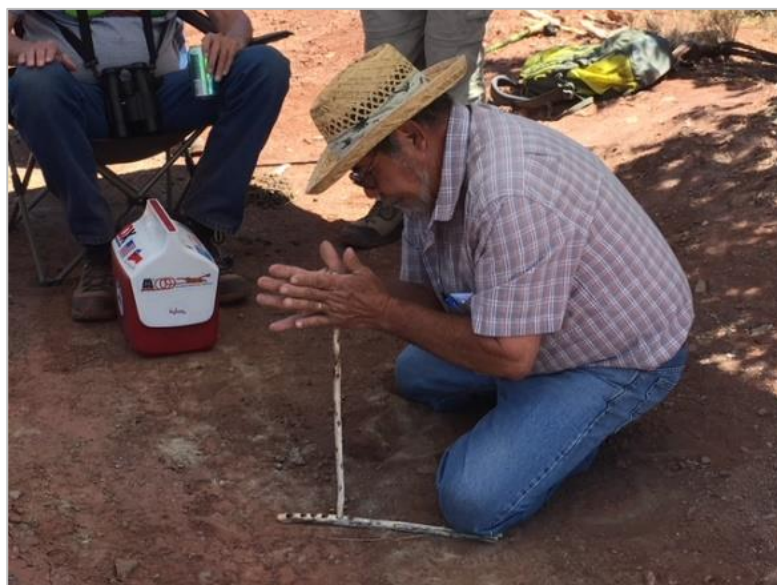

Mike Chavez

Sevilleta's Volunteer Naturalist extraordinaire when it comes to the area's history is Mike Chavez. New Pollinator Garden Fence

Amigos Board members recently replaced the Pollinator Garden enclosure outside of the Visitor Center. The existing enclosure had become somewhat dilapidated over time. Members removed the bricks and installed meta-capped posts and rabbit fencing around the garden. The fence has a 6-inch underground barrier to keep out digging rabbits and hares.

In the Spring, we will re-plant the garden with a variety of perennial and annual plants to attract native pollinators.

The fence was financed by private contributions from Amigos members. The Board would like to thank all who contributed their time and funds.

New fence completed. The rabbit fencing is painted black to make it less visible. One of the fence panels can be easily removed to access the garden. The posts are treated with a copper preservative below ground and have a protective stain above ground.
