Manager's Update

If you visit the refuge over the next couple of months you'll see several new faces. Christy, Jess, Cesar and Lyle are our four summer seasonals and they are helping with Gunnison's prairie dog reintroduction, invasive species monitoring and retreatment, and monitoring our riparian restoration efforts.

Speaking of the riparian restoration project, it is almost done and the area will be back open to the public by September 1. This project provides habitat for three endangered species (Southwestern Willow Flycatcher, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, and Rio Grande Silvery Minnow), and also improved waterfowl hunting areas. We will now have designated parking areas and three hunting blinds, including one that is fully accessible for mobility-impaired hunters.

Outside of the hunting season, this area will be open for wildlife observation.

For those of you who like to hike, we've added a new hiking trail to the trail system around the Visitor Center. The 2-mile Ladrones Vista Trail connects the Mesa View Trail with the Nature Loop Trail. This trail was built primarily by volunteers along with several days of help from the Rocky Mountain Youth Corps. Come check it out!

We truly could not accomplish nearly as much without our volunteers. Several members of the Backcountry Horsemen volunteered their time and effort one Saturday in June (think hot) to fix a significant stretch of boundary fence along the north side of San Lorenzo Canyon. Our boundary fence is crucial in protecting refuge resources, and deterring trespass by both people and cows.

Amigos!

Hot and dry!! If that's all that's keeping you from a visit to Sevilleta, get up a little earlier and take a cool morning hike on the trails by the Visitors' Center. Bring your lunch, eat, and siesta watching hummingbirds on the covered patio at the back of the Center. Check out the sunset behind the Ladrones. Even though the Visitors Center is not open before 8 or after 4:30 there is still plenty of access to trails, wildlife and fresh air...ok, maybe a little dust, too, but that's NM this year.

The following is borrowed from the Sevilleta webpage...

Sevilleta National Wildlife Refuge trails are open sunrise to sunset. Our Visitor Center's hours are 8:00 am - 4:30 pm Monday through Friday, Saturday 9:00 am - 4:00 pm, and our gate hours are 8:00 am - 4:30 pm Monday through Saturday. You are allowed to park at the entry gate and walk in to enjoy the trails when the Visitor Center and gate are not open. Restroom facilities are available at the Visitor Center during open hours

The website is a good source of info about the refuge. There is a printable trails map so you can plan your walks. There's is a new trail that will be added to the map this summer. You can also access a Field Guide to Flowers for help identifying all the flowering plants you can see along the trails. Cactus have been blooming recently, lighting up the landscape with their brilliant reds, pinks, and white. Desert marigolds are adding their happy yellow faces to the landscape as well.

I was planning to band hummingbirds on the back patio at the Visitors' Center on June 16 from 8 – 10. In a bittersweet turn of events, that didn't happen as it was pouring rain!! You can't band wet birds...they get cold and this endangers their future good health. So instead, I gave a bird-free demonstration and talk in the lobby of the visitors' center. I set up all my equipment and 25 or so visitors listened to the talk, frequently stopping it to ask questions...here's some of that talk.

This time of year, black chinned hummers dominate the feeders...and I DO mean DOMINATE! These tiniest of birds are feisty and tough as they defend their food sources from each other. The males put on a show to impress the girls with their beautiful plumage and acrobatic flying skills. The females like being courted...and make their own choices about whose genes they accept. Female hummingbirds build nests, lay eggs, raise their young all by themselves. Sometimes they will raise two or even three broods in a summer. They are seriously tough cookies!! So, how do I catch them? How big are their bands? Do they really have legs? The answers are: in a trap holding a feeder; really tiny and I have to make them myself; and, e=yes they have the shortest legs you can imagine...in fact, their feet are longer toe-to-toe than their legs.

If you want to know more and if it doesn't rain, I'll be banding again at Sevilleta when southward migration starts. Mark your calendars for August 18th, 8am – 10am!!
